




Safety Coordinator

Several concerns were voiced at our last business meeting about the safety of flying various quadcopters and small electric planes in undesignated areas. There was discussion about our current safety rules and what rules apply in this situation. We understand that we have a lot of new members and maybe it is time to address this situation. Fortunately the rules are very clear and there is no wiggle room on this whatsoever.



To really oversimplify the matter, it comes down to this. If you have a transmitter in your hands and are flying any type of aircraft no matter the size or type, you must be at a flight station obeying all flight rules. All flights are to be east of the runway, no exception.

Thanks for your cooperation in this matter. Let's have fun safely. See you at the field. Herbby

RDRC CLUB MINUTES July 28, 2015

President Larry Lewis called the meeting to order at 6:35 PM on July 28, 2015 in the Forks Restaurant in Wake Forest. All club officers except Marshall Sanderson and Steve Ballard were present. Welcoming remarks were made and there were 23 members present and three new members were voted in.

Larry noted that Alex Frederickson entered the Youth IMAC event at Triple Tree and finished second.

Treasurer's report: Clyde Long reported that with all bills paid thru July 28, 2015 the club had in our account. Safety Officers Report: Herbby Alford reminded everyone to use common sense and be respectful. If you see a problem, wait until the pilot has landed then talk nicely to him. All members are reminded to obey posted flying rules and be careful.

Secretary's Report: Clyde Long reported for Marshall Sanderson that as of this date there were 128 paid members. A motion to accept the June minutes as posted in the Newsletter was made by Ed Radial and seconded by Don King.

IT Communications Officer's Report: Steve Ballard was not present. The cameras and picture updates seem to be working fine.

RDRC CLUB MINUTES for July 28, 2015, Continued

Field Marshal's Report: John Keisler reported on runway repair. Thirty 5 gallon containers of sealer were required to do one half of the runway. A truck will be needed to get sealer. Ed Radiel will help with truck. Weather may be a problem but plans are for 8/5/15 with backup 8/8/15 at 9 AM. At least 6 people will be needed.

Old Business: Club pig picking and National Aviation Day is 8/15/15. Don King will cook pig and beans, club will buy pig and drinks and supplies. Members bring dish to share. Rodney will send out notice and members need to respond so they we know how many plan to attend.

Rodney Earp will bring approximately 17 scouts to field on 8/2/15. Members bring trainers and buddy box equipment to field for the event. Rodney will supply hot dogs and pasta salad to participants. Members are reminded that quad copters need to obey the same flight rules as helicopters. Out Safety Flight Rules that were revised in 4/15 cover quads.

AMA club flag "Award of Excellence" will need to be specially made (possible 3' x 2' double sided) with logos. Dave Langridge and Ken Wade to continue to check prices, etc. Motion made by Ken Wade and seconded by Mark Lofgren to proceed with cost not to exceed \$400. Motion passed.

New Business: AMA to go to renewals one year after new or renewed membership rather than January to December for everyone. This will require some changes to verify AMA membership for club members as AMA can expire during yearly RDRC membership. These changes need to be worked out so our membership database can track AMA and club membership accurately.

Preparations for Fly for Tots is beginning. We will borrow Alan's tractor to cut grass, maybe two times before event. Victory Junction is happy that we are doing the event again. Raffle tickets will be available 1st week in August. Grand prize will be a Horizon Hobbies Warbird, a big Corsair with retracts. Anderson R/C to donate a DX9 radio. Hangar 18 will donate servos. "First in Flight" to donate accessories. Desert Aircraft will provide a motor. Radio Wave and J-Tec will provide motor accessories.

The Mall Show at North Hills will be on August 29th, a Saturday from 8AM to 2PM. Rodney will have details in next Newsletter. A motion was made by Larry Lewis and seconded by Ed Radiel to adjourn. Motion passed, and the meeting adjourned at approximately 7:50 PM.

Alex's Great Adventures



Many of you already know me, I'm Alex Fredrickson, and I'd like to share some of the amazing activities regarding our hobby that I've been able to attend. My dad and I went to Joe Nall for the first time this year and I would strongly recommend you go to at least look at the beautiful planes and airfield. But this article is really about the youth related activities, Camp AMA and Youth Masters.

For the past two years, I have had the privilege to attend Camp AMA. This is a one week camp held at AMA headquarters in Muncie, IN. Camp AMA is open to anyone between the ages of 13 and 19 with any experience level. This past year we had four girls! We had some beginners and some expert sponsored kids. We worked with "youth ambassadors" such as Nick Maxwell, R.J. Gritter, and Andrew Jesky as well as AMA staff. Jessy Symmes coordinates the camp and does a terrific job keeping things going and tries to keep us in line.

We stay at a nearby Holiday Inn. All meals are provided either by the hotel or we go out to places like Applebee's, Buffalo Brothers, or Outback. Lunch is usually pizza at the field. Camp is a tremendous bargain, just \$800 for the week including hotel and all meals.

We do more than just fly. We have taken field trips to a local airport and soaring club where we got to sit in a glider and warbird. The local fire department came out and demonstrated their snorkel on us. And we sometimes fish in the ponds or go swimming at the hotel.









It all starts at check-in shown in the pictures above. Everything from quad-copters and foamies to 50cc planes. Kids from all over the US attend, we've had kids from New York, Florida, Texas, and California. Some will ship their planes in crates or boxes. My dad and I just packed our van and made the 9 hour drive.

During my time at Camp, I made some good friends that I have kept up with over the year. Some I've seen at Joe Nall, others I chat with regularly online. I learned a lot at camp, mostly from other pilots. We don't have any real classroom instruction or training, more just working with the ambassadors and other pilots. We had night flights, indoor flights at a local gymnasium, competitions, and streamer battles. As they say, a picture is worth a thousand words so check out the Camp's Flickr page:


If you have a youngster or know someone who would enjoy this, I strongly recommend sending them to Camp AMA. The experience, education, and friendships will last a life time and its not that expensive – less than a 35% airframe!

Last month I attended Youth Masters held at Triple Tree Aerodrome. Youth Masters is a free program for kids up to 16 years of age. At Youth Masters you learn the IMAC moves and compete in either the Basic or Advanced category. This was my first time in an IMAC competition and I came in second place.

The guy who finished in first place had been coming to YM for five years and the guy in third place for four years. You can bring your own planes to fly during free time, but you use 100cc planes provided by Youth Masters. Everyone is flying the same type of plane using their transmitters so the competition is more about the pilot's skill than the plane.



For those not familiar with IMAC, check out http://www.mini-iac.com. IMAC uses the Aresti system for diagramming aerobatic figures. You may have seen these on the RD-RC website and wondered what they are. Here are some examples:



The routines used in an IMAC competition usually have 10 moves, all done in sequence without any extra fly-bys or go arounds. The routines are published ahead of time and there are standard routines for the year in each category; basic, sportsman, intermediate, advanced, and unlimited.

At Youth Masters we camped on site at the 3D gazebo, right on the flight line. Lunch was provided each day. On Saturday night there was a 3D Foamie freestyle competition. I did really well, many people congratulated me on my routine but I didn't win even though Flying Giants had my name posted as the winner for a couple of days. I had a great time, learned a lot, and made new friends at Youth Masters. My only regret is that I am now too old to compete at Youth Masters but I can return to help others and I'm sure I will. 
Prior to this day the whole runway had all the cracks cleaned and filled on some of the hottest days in June and July.
